


## Introduction

The past year (August 2014 - July 2015) has been a particularly busy one for Museum Services. Thanks to our on-going developmental funding from the Scottish Funding Council and a capital grant from Museums Galleries Scotland, we were able to appoint our former MGS Intern Hope Roberts to a new Assistant Curator post for two years. This is the first time that we have had a second professional member of staff and it has made a significant difference to our activities, particularly in student support and schools outreach. Overall, this year has seen an $87 \%$ increase in the number of people making active use of our services, including a 69\% increase in student use and a 42\% increase in visitor numbers in the Zoology Museum.

Highlights of the past year include our involvement in Riddles of Form, a major international word and image conference, and the commemorative activities of the Great War Dundee partnership. In the Lamb Gallery, our exhibitions Between Tides, Mono 68 and Jim Petrie: Minnie the Minx and More have been among the most popular we have ever held. We have also undertaken one of our largest permanent displays of art on campus, with over 60 prints and paintings put on show around the School of Education, Social Work \& Community Education.

In 2015 we celebrated the 21st birthday of Museum Services. This report reveals some of the activities that we have been doing as we reached our majority. I hope you will enjoy reading it.

One of our main aims is to provide an exciting and inspiring exhibition programme. In the absence of a permanent museum building, temporary exhibitions are our principal method of showcasing the collections. During 2014-15 we put on fourteen public exhibitions, mostly in our regular spaces but also at Dundee Science Centre, Ninewells Hospital and Centrespace.

Three of these exhibitions (Riddles \& Answers, The Word is Art and Resonate) were staged to accompany the international word and image conference Riddles of Form in August 2014, for which Museum Services was responsible for co-ordinating an accompanying exhibition programme - this also included displays in the Dalhousie Building and the Queen Mother Building. In addition, an informal display of recently conserved paintings from the Duncan of Jordanstone College Collection was also staged in the DJCAD Entrance in June 2015, and we also helped the Scottish Centre for Comics Studies stage a display of art by celebrated comics illustrator Dave Gibbons to accompany his honorary doctorate award at Graduation.

## Loans

As well as curating our own shows, in the past year we lent 33 items from the collection to other exhibitions on campus, most notably to the Scales of Life, Material Concerns and Transmissions exhibitions in LifeSpace, the new science-art gallery in the Discovery Centre. This exciting new space was opened in October 2014 and is curated by Sarah Cook (DJCAD) and Morag Martin (Life Sciences), who draw regularly on material in our collections.

We also lent 92 objects to other exhibitions around the country, including Realised, part of the Royal Scottish Academy's Annual Exhibition; Doctors in the Making at the Museum of the University of St Andrews; Jeepers Creepers: The Works of Eduardo Paolozzi from Dundee Collections at The McManus: Dundee's Art Gallery \& Museum and Poles Apart at the Scottish Fisheries Museum.

The D'Arcy Thompson Zoology Museum continues to be our principal permanent display, open regularly on Friday afternoons during the summer, and for special events throughout the year. Among the 1,239 visitors welcomed this year (a 39\% increase on last year) were many special guests including mathematical biologist L Mahadevan, award-winning writer Jung Chang, artist Roman Signer and prospective students on the Test Drive Dundee initiative.

This year we also secured a grant from Museums Galleries Scotland which will enable us to create new labels and other forms of interpretation for the museum. We have been working on this throughout summer 2015 (over 350 labels produced so far!) and hope to show off the results later in the year.

Unfortunately, the redevelopment of the Tayside Medical History Museum was subject to further delays but the order for new display cases has now been placed and work will proceed soon. In the meantime, we organised three medical history events in the School of Medicine and staged a very popular exhibition in the main concourse at Ninewells marking the 40th anniversary of the hospital, which received considerable media coverage.

As part of our on-going aim to enhance the cultural ambience of the campus, we put up a record 123 works of art on long-term display in eighteen different schools and departments around the University, including Student Services, Finance, Law, Life Sciences, DJCAD and the new Enquiry Centre at DUSA . Most notably, in August 2014 we completed what is probably our largest such undertaking so far - 63 artworks for the corridors and shared spaces of the School of Education, Social Work \& Community Education, chosen by school staff in a project called Watch This Space.

During the past year, 389 items were catalogued and added to our museum database, bringing the total number of accessioned items in the collection to 29,747. As with last year, many of these were existing specimens from our Herbarium which had not previously been fully catalogued - this work is now complete thanks to volunteer Richard Blackmore and he has now begun the huge task of photographing every specimen, which will prove a considerable aid to students, professional researchers and us!

With the help of funding from Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art \& Design, we continued to acquire a selection of artworks from the DJCAD Degree Show - this year branching out into textiles, jewellery and other disciplines as well as our usual selection of fine art. DJCAD also purchased various pieces to add to the artists' book collection, abcD. Two DJCAD students were also commissioned to create new artworks for the Law Library; these have also been accessioned into the collections. Other purchases included an etching by D'Arcy Thompson's daughter Molly and prints by renowned Scottish artists Ken Currie and Jim Lambie.
Several donations were made to the collections during the past year. These included more than 100 drawings by the Dundee war poet and illustrator Joseph Lee which had been given by Lee's widow to the artist James McIntosh Patrick, and were donated to us by his daughter Ann Hunter. Several of these will be included in an exhibition we are planning on Lee in 2016. We also received some fascinating mementos of John W Kimber, the first director of the University's Fleming Gymnasium (the predecessor of today's Institute of Sport \& Exercise). Kimber served in the Black Watch during the Great War and was killed in 1918. His grand-daughter Dr Ida Kimber (also an alumnus of University College, Dundee) kindly gifted various items including his ceremonial sword and silver cigarette case, all of which were included in our exhibition The University at War.

Other donations include an oil by the Carnoustie-based painter James Torrington Bell (donated by Roddy Lewis); a ceramic piece by Fiona Thompson (donated by the artist); and cartoons by Alexander Cullen Brown (donated by the artist's nephew). We are very grateful to all the generous donors responsible for these and other gifts.

The on-going care of our collections remains an important priority for us, and during the past year several paintings from the DJCAD collection have undergone conservation treatment by Egan, Matthews \& Rose. These include one of our biggest paintings, Wedding by Hugh Bryning, created in 1964 as part of a short-lived class in mural painting run by lan Eadie. The results of the conservators' work so far were displayed in the DJCAD Entrance over summer 2015.


## Audiences

A key aim of the museum service is to extend our reach to allow as many people as possible to enjoy and be inspired by our amazing collections. Our main exhibition galleries are in public spaces with a high foot-fall (nearly 33,000 last year in the Lamb Gallery, for example), but we are always keen to reach out more directly to audiences through special events relating to our exhibitions and collections. In the past year we held 29 public events, including:

Several activities to tie into the Bodies in Motion exhibition, including talks by Prof Nick Wade from Psychology and Phil Vaughan from Animation; a make-your-own-zoetrope workshop; and a guided tour by student curator Alix Marion

A lecture by photographer Phil Thomson and two discussion events to accompany the Mono 68 exhibition

Two events for Dundee Science Festival - an anesthetics evening at Ninewells featuring talks and displays of old and new equipment, and an art and poetry workshop run by Derek Robertson and Jim Stewart to accompany the exhibition Between Tides

An animal-inspired crafternoon in the Zoology Museum for Festival of Museums
Special openings and tours for Doors Open Days and Christmas Light Night
Exhibition tours by artist Robert McGilvray (of Time/Tide - Moments from Places) and Mark Wallace (of A Passion for Print)

In addition, a further 205 people attended events which we hosted or participated in, including a Women in Science event in the Zoology Museum, the launch of our Joseph Lee book at Dundee Literary Festival and the annual University Culture Day, which last year was a collaboration with the new Centre for Scottish Culture. As part of Great War Dundee we also helped to organise the hugely popular World War One at Home event in Caird Hall and City Square in collaboration with the BBC, which attracted over 10,000 visitors over two days.

Some 645 people also attended talks by the Curator or museum volunteers given at conferences (including the Medical Pilgrims conference in Dundee, a Scottish Society for Art History study day in Perth and a workshop on Digital Cultural Resources in Glasgow) or to external organisations (such as Alyth Literary Society, the High School of Dundee, Abertay Probus Club and Claverhouse Rotary Club).

Numerous societies, professional bodies and community groups also visited our exhibitions and collections during the past year, including the Dundee Naturalists' Society, the Chuckles Club (a community group from Ardler), the Agnes Savill Club from St Andrews, the Society of Biology, the Tayside Museums Forum and University Museums in Scotland.

A notable development spearheaded by our new assistant curator in the past year has been our contact with local primary schools. Various school groups have visited the D'Arcy Thompson Zoology Museum, and we have also taken specimens from the museum to other local schools with the assistance of Education students. The Zoology Museum also became the University's first accredited learning destination for Children's University, a nationwide initiative encouraging out-of-school learning for 5-14 year olds.

## Students

The University of Dundee is renowned for the quality of its student experience, and as a university museum, supporting our students is one of our most important priorities. This year we have been working closely with the School of Education, Social Work \& Community Education to develop the use of our collections in schools and to train prospective teachers to use collections to enhance classroom learning. In conjunction with Children's University we worked with two fourth year Education students, Angela Strachan and Kym Cleary, to run workshops for local primary schools using specimens from the Zoology Museum. Victoria Park and Blackness Primary Schools took part in the project, which proved a great success with the pupils. We hope to develop this relationship further in the future.



We also provided four formal work placements for undergraduate and postgraduate students from the Universities of Dundee, St Andrews and Aberdeen, plus informal work experience for a further 11 students or graduands.

Students from various other institutions also came to use the collections, including Abertay University, Dundee \& Angus College, Moray College of Art, City \& Guilds and Perth College. The Curator also continued to teach evening classes in film history for Continuing Education.

## Research

Supporting the local and international research community is an important part of our service. During the past year we answered 276 enquiries on a variety of topics including the artist Patti Jack (the University's first female lecturer); the history of the Dundee Limb Fitting Centre; artistic dress in Scotland 1880-1900; gorilla pathology; and the HMS Challenger Research Project. 137 of these were from University of Dundee staff and students while 139 were external researchers. 134 research visits were made to view material from the collections, 106 from within the University and 28 from external researchers, including PhD students from the University of St Andrews, the Bartlett and Royal Holloway.

The creation and dissemination of new knowledge relating to our collections is also an important aim, and this year the Curator has given a number of public lectures as well as organising a D'Arcy Thompson session at the Riddles of Form word and image conference, and organising a study day on Scottish Art in the Great War for the Scottish Society for Art History.

Our most notable publication this year has been a new volume of First World War poems by Joseph Lee, which curator Matthew Jarron has co-edited with Caroline Brown from Archive Services. The University holds the largest collection of Lee's work and it is hoped that this new book will help to re-establish Lee's reputation as a significant literary and artistic talent.

Matthew also contributed an essay on The Early History of Design in Dundee to the UNESCO City of Design launch programme and has been completing a major publication on Art in Dundee 1867-1924 which will be published later in 2015.



## Partnerships

As a small service we are always keen to work in partnership with other organisations to maximise the impact and effectiveness of what we do. Some of the activities undertaken in the past year were:

Scottish Word \& Image Group - as a member of the SWIG committee, Curator Matthew Jarron contributed to the winning bid for Dundee to host the prestigious International Association of Word \& Image Studies triennial conference in August 2014, based around themes inspired by D'Arcy Thompson and Patrick Geddes. Matthew organised a D'Arcy-themed session at the conference and gave the introductory keynote lecture.

Great War Dundee - Museum Services continues to play a key role in this city-wide partnership marking the centenary of World War One. Matthew is a member of the steering group, helping to organise various events including the major two-day collaboration with the BBC in Caird Hall on 1-2 August 2014 and leading on the unveiling of the Post Office Memorial Shrine, a time capsule sealed after the war with instructions that it should be opened on 4 August 2014 (shown above).

Discovery Walk - Matthew is one of the organisers of a public art project aiming to celebrate significant Dundonians through a series of plaques in the new waterfront. After a public consultation the first nine plaques have been chosen and are currently being designed.

Dundee Science Centre - we have continued our long-standing collaboration by staging exhibitions in the centre and loaning objects for their own shows (for example a number of prehistoric fossils to accompany their Dino Dig workshops). Matthew also gave a talk as part of the Café Science Extra series to accompany the centre's Ice Station Antarctica exhibition.

Tayside Museums Forum - Matthew completed his final year as Chair of the Forum, during which we welcomed several new members to the group including the Unicorn Preservation Society and the Library of Innerpeffray.

Matthew also serves as Secretary of the Abertay Historical Society and is a member of various other networks and collaborations including the Dundee Cultural Agencies Network, the Scottish Society for Art History, Scotland \& Medicine and UMiS (University Museums in Scotland). Assistant curator Hope Roberts is a member of a new UMiS sub-group devoted to student engagement.

## Finance

## Operating Budget 2014-15: £14,700

We also maintain the remainder of the Fine Art Fund set up in 1960 for the benefit of the University's art collections. This stood at $£ 3,175.99$ at 1 Aug 2014 and $£ 3,456.30$ at 31 July 2015.

$£ 12,870$ (Museums Galleries Scotland grant for new lighting in the Lamb Gallery, to be installed in 2015-16)

$£ 4,000$ (London Mathematical Society grant for biomathematics exhibition in Dundee Science Centre, opened August 2015)

We were also a partner in a Carnegie Trust application led by Lorens Holm from Architecture, for which the University has been awarded $£ 7,482$ to stage an exhibition and events programme examining the contemporary relevance of Patrick Geddes's book Cities in Evolution, begun in October 2015.
