The School of Business was awarded the PRME Sharing Information on Progress (SIP) award. The School is honoured by this important recognition.




Celebrating 50 Years of Accountancy

2022 marks the 50th Anniversary of the Department of Accountancy at the University of Dundee. As part of the celebrations, the Department organised 2-days of events on the 26th and 27th August. At these events, alumni, former colleagues and the business community was invited. The events included:

- a welcome by the Principal (Professor Iain Gillespie) and the Dean of the School of Business (Prof Morris Altman);
- videos by the University archivist, Dr Kenneth Baxter on the history of the department of Accountancy, and also its building (1 Perth Road);

- → a presentation of research conducted on the origins and development of the department (by Dr Renzo Cordina, Dr Alison Fordyce and Prof David Power);
- talks by Greg Colgan (Chief Executive of Dundee City Council) and Adair Simpson (Deputy Chief Executive Officer of Carnoustie Golf Club) on Dundee's future;
- a presentation by Professor David Collison reflecting on the contribution of Professor Rob Gray during his time in the Department of Accountancy and Business Finance;
- a discussion with alumni and members of the business community on the future of the profession and accounting education and;
- → dinner with alumni and former staff at the V&A Museum.
- → Research interviews with former staff at the time of the Department of Accountancy's founding in 1972 suggested that a separate department for the discipline was established at this time because of (i) growing "respect" for the discipline of accounting within the University of Dundee, (ii) the potential income stream from students wanting to study the subject and join the profession, (iii) the establishment of similar departments in other universities and, (iv) the desire by the accountancy profession for a graduate entry route.



Interactive Workshop: Can Do Collective

An interactive workshop was arranged on Friday 8th July led by Dr. Seemab Farooqi and Dr Stephen Knox on the Can Do Collective. This workshop was part of the research project exploring the impact of co-working spaces on users, communities, and regions and was attended by key participants from Social Enterprise, Bright Red Triangle (Edinburgh Napier University), The Circle, The Melting Pot, Abertay University, Glasgow Collective, and Business Gateway. This workshop facilitated an engaging discussion with peers involved in the operations and community engagement of co-working spaces. They all contributed to the study by sharing our insights, practices, and some of the feedback they had captured from their users. This workshop provided an opportunity to inform the research project and contributed to the development of an impact assessment framework. At the same time, it also provided an opportunity for peer-to-peer knowledge exchange and an opportunity for networking. The next phase is the dissemination of research findings, and it is intended to host another workshop where key participants will be invited for knowledge exchange.





Conferences hosted by the School of Business

Professor Allanson organises SGPE PhD Conference

The Scottish Graduate Programme in Economics is a collaborative venture between eight top Scottish universities which offers three taught masters programmes in economics and a range of events and training activities for affiliated PhD students. Professor Paul Allanson in his role as SGPE PhD Co-Director organised the 2022 SGPE PhD Conference, which was held in person for the first time since 2020.

The main purpose of this annual event is to give affiliated PhD students the opportunity to present their work and receive feedback on it from an academic not located at their own institution. This year 24 students made presentations while 20 members of staff, including six from Dundee, acted as discussants. The inaugural SGPE PhD Student Presentation Prize was awarded to Yaoyao Xu from the University of Edinburgh for her presentation "Reasoning and Learning in Dominance Solvable Games: An Experimental Study."

The conference programme also included keynote sessions from Andrew Clausen and Chris Stapenhurst (University of Edinburgh) on the process of writing a research paper and Mairi Spowage (University of Strathclyde) on the broader impact of economic research. Participants had the opportunity to network during breaks in the programme and at the conference dinner.

UDSB hosts Scottish Health Economics one-day event

UDSB hosted a Scottish Health Economics one-day event in the Dalhousie building on 6 September. SHE aims to support, promote and further develop health economics in Scotland by bringing together health economists from across academia, the NHS and government. Scotland has a rich source of routine data and has been a pioneer in the use of linked health service data, with the morning session providing an overview and applications with a view to encouraging its wider use and explore potential collaborations. The afternoon programme consisted of a number of short presentations by early career health economists (organised by the Scottish Health Economics Early Career network) and a session on careers in health economics. The event was a great success with more than 50 participants attending the event in person and another 50 virtually.

Funding awards

Research with impact into healthcare management in NHS Scotland

Colleagues in the School have been successful in winning two recent awards for research into healthcare management. These awards build earlier successes in income generation in the attraction, engagement and retention of staff in the NHS in Scotland.

The first is for £17,600 to Professor Graeme Martin awarded by a consortium of NHS Scotland employers, the British Medical Association and the Scottish Academy of Medical Royal Colleges to conduct research into the extent and reasons underlying doctors' early retiral and scaling down of work commitments. This phenomenon was recently highlighted by the Cabinet Secretary for Health as one of the major problems facing the NHS in Scotland, which is why these three bodies have come together for the first time to commission joint research.

The second is for seedcorn funding of £8000 by NHS Tayside to extend a UoD IDF grant to research into Employer Branding and Talent Management in NHS Tayside: What Does Good Look Like From an Employee Perspective? Professor Graeme Martin, Dr Stephanie Schreven, Professor Norin Arshed and Dr Keith Dinnie have conducted an extensive interview programme over the summer with employees across all types of occupations and career stages in NHS Tayside to understand their past and present experiences of work and what a positive future would look like. This work provides an important evidence-base to underpin NHS Tayside's strategic ambitions to enhance the Board's reputation as an employer of choice with existing and potential employees and to enhance its reputation as a key anchor institution in the regional economy. Further work is planned for further research into future sensemaking of 'what good looks like'.

Successful Grant Award: How controls in accounting systems are developed to maintain pace with developments in technology

Professor David Power, Dr Alison Dordyce and Dr Rasha Abdelbadie were successful in securing \$10,000 AUS to support two case studies to investigate how controls in accounting systems are developed to maintain pace with developments in technology.

These controls include those required to maintain the integrity/ethics of business practices as well those to ensure the robustness and accuracy of information produced. As such, the following research questions will be addressed:

- How, when and what control systems are designed and implemented for new technologies in the case study organisations?
- 2. What controls ensure the integrity of data, decision making and processes for new technologies in the case study organisations?

The case studies will comprise interviews with key people in the organisation who source, use, analyse, report and visualise data from warehouses created by various technologies. The auditors of both organisations will be also be approached for their views. In addition, the two research teams will observe daily practices of various personnel interacting with data and technology. Furthermore, we would review relevant documents, including procedure and policy manuals for IT, Finance and Internal Audit and Assurance staff as well as Operational staff to assess the controls that have been identified and implemented by the relevant organisation.

Funding awards continued

2022 PRME Research Seed Funding Competition

Dr Yang Wang and Dr Nicolas Li were successful in securing PRME funding for their project 'Be kind to mother nature: Are female independent directors greener in the UK?'.

This was an excellent proposal on an important topic with a strong connection to the objectives of PRME, as well as several SDGs.

Successful Grant Award

Dr Jihye Kim was awarded £7,500 funding from Anglia Ruskin University with collaborators (I-Shou Chen from Anglia Ruskin University, Wladislaw Rivkin from Trinity College Dublin, Jiwon Song from University of Edinburgh) for the project titled 'The Role of Industry 4.0 Technologies and Employee Wellbeing and Creativity'.

Seedcorn Funding

Dr Renzo Cordina, Professor Bill Nixon, Professor David Power and Dr Yang Wang have been awarded seedcorn funding of £1,000 from the School of Business. This research is being carried out with the help of Jack Pringle (BAcc graduate, 2022). This project will examine changes in reporting about corporate culture following new requirements issued by the Financial Reporting Council in 2018. Specifically, the disclosures about corporate culture in 2017 will be compared to those in 2021, to look at UK company compliance in this area. The topic of corporate culture is seen as a vital issue in promoting good governance within companies and reducing the likelihood of corporate scandals and company failure.
